Reformation Lutheran Church

What do you remember about the church you attended where you grew up? Maybe you have some old photograph that shows family [dressed in Sunday best] posing for a moment in time. Can you remember the people, the pastor, and how you felt about church? Was your church full of grace?

The liturgical color of the season is green, which speaks to our growth in faith as we follow the teachings and ministry of Christ. Grace is the thread that connects our lectionary readings together as we hear Scripture reveal the depth and breadth of our holy Father's love for us. Our Father pours out his grace upon us like rain! Shouldn't we be so grace-soaked and saturated that our natural response in every thought, word, and deed is dripping with grace? It's easy to give out grace as a child of God to another when we've not been hurt; it is not easy to pour out our grace when we have been hurt.

We read St. Paul's epistle to the Romans (Romans 8:28, ESV): "For we know that for those who love God all things work together for good, for those who are called according to his purpose." These words of Paul are intended to bring comfort to the hearer who is in the midst of suffering and persecution. I wonder if the Jews that Paul was encouraging wrestled with this scriptural truth as much as we do, as much as I have.

I can testify that during trial, persecution, and suffering—though I knew God was always with me—I didn't rejoice in the pain nor did I find much comfort in the 'already but not yet' truth that my Abba would take this season and cause goodness to grow from it in time. In spite of my 'understanding,' God did cause good and continues to cause good to spring forth from my suffering—and from your suffering, as well. His grace makes all the difference.

When we find ourselves surrounded by pain, doubt, suffering, or persecution, we must trust the author of our faith. We must continue through this chapter in our lives until we reach the chapter that says, "God is good and His love endures forever!" His grace sustains us; His means of grace for us is found through baptism and communion. The holy sacraments equip us, nourish us, and enable us to walk by faith and not by our circumstances or feelings.

The Holy Spirit, which is received through baptism, gives us wisdom "to see the Father in all things" as we grow in Christ. The Holy Spirit who dwells in us gives us eyes to see where Abba has caused good things to come from the darkest of our experiences. The Holy Spirit gives us the power to extend grace to others—even those who have hurt us.

My prayer is that we continue to grow in His grace. I pray that we continue to read the Word outside of Sunday morning. I pray that we would encourage our family (grown-ups too) to find a church and attend regularly to hear of Christ and him crucified for the forgiveness of sin. Nothing else on this green earth matters more.


REFORMATION SUNDAY
